DEVIANT WOMEN OF THE FRENCH REVOLUTION AND THE RISE OF FEMINISM By LISA BECKSTRAND

This work aims to uncover the work of Parisian women who challenged prevailing views of female nature, sought social reforms, and were deemed "deviant" for their writing and/or activism during the French Revolution. While some consideration is given to a discussion of those women activists and public figures accused of being crazy, sexually deviant, or of corrupting future generations, the bulk of analysis focuses on the work of Olympe de Gouges and Manon Roland, both of whom played active political roles in the Revolution and used writing as a means to influence public opinion. While de Gouges took unpopular stances on women's rights, citizenship, and the abolition of slavery, Roland wrote lengthy memoirs documenting her covert means of participating in the political salons and her hidden attempts to shape political and social policies. The work of both authors reveals ideological shifts in how gender was understood and gives a broader understanding of the ways in which women writers struggled to define themselves during the most turbulent period in French history. Disenthralling Ourselves portrays contemporary Israel in a process of transition. Jewish-Israeli and Palestinian-Israeli communities share a nation-state divided by the separate truths of its conflicting fundamental narratives. This book considers ways of converting those separate and antagonistic narratives from fuel for conflict to seeds of change. Its purpose is to undo the convenient coherence of collective memory and master narratives through fostering a capacious moral imagination able to apprehend diverse, even contentious, stories and truths. Contemporary Israel functions as a case study in an in-depth and interdisciplinary exploration of conflict resolution, viewing Jewish-Israeli and Palestinian-Israeli doc-

umentary film, poetry, fiction, essays, memoirs, peace initiatives, and other elements of collective narrative-building through a prism of three analogously themed Shakespearean plays. This comparativist methodology is integrated with theoretical perspectives on reconciliation, resilience, critical reflection, and peace education in presenting concrete alternatives to the convenient comforts of the inimical master narratives that perpetuate what can now be seen as a hundred-year war. Economic aid is one component of peacebuilding that has been given increasing prominence in its ability to build both sustainable peace and development. This book analyzes the impact of economic aid on peacebuilding initiatives, looking at the example of Northern Ireland. Through qualitative data analysis of thirty-six interviews with European Union Peace I Fund and International Fund for Ireland funding agency civil servants, development officers, as well as community group leaders whose projects received funding from one or both funders, this book addresses whether international financial assistance is able to target the structural forces that have been known to exacerbate ethnic conflicts, and points to both the successes and failures of international financial assistance in the perception of the civilian population. MEDICAL CULTURE IN REVOLUTIONARY AMERICA Feuds, Duels, and a Court-Martial

By LINDA MYRSIADES

This study examines eighteenth-century doctors' feuds and duels with a focus on epidemics, Philadelphia, trials by press, issues of medical malpractice, anti-medical riots, and a courtmartial of the medical director of the army hospitals during the revolutionary war. It explores issues of the medical marketplace that arose from competition between regular physicians and quacks and it considers the outrage over graverobbing to provide cadavers for medical dissection. The focus of the study, however, is on the feuds that characterized American medical practice from the colonial to the federal periods. Even before yellow fever epidemics of the 1790s turned Philadelphia into a crucible testing medical theories and therapeutics, physicians had an uneasy professional his-tory of unstable alliances and networks. Study of the feud between Philadelphians John Morgan and William Shippen, successive directors of the Continental Army hospitals in the years of the American Revolution and founders of the first American medical college, gives us an opportunity to capture the condition of American medicine in the eighteenth century at both the individual and institutional levels. This book examines how the hierarchical structures of taste implied by the term "middlebrow" were negotiated by the bestselling novelist, Warwick Deeping (1877–1950). The introduction outlines how Marxists and Bourdieu have characterized tastes associated with the petit bourgeoisie as homogeneous and determined by the market. The first chapter compares British and American attitudes towards culture of "the middling sorts." The third, biographical, chapter deals with the way in which Deeping represents his own class position as author. Subsequent chapters examine the way Deeping's early novels dramatize his sense of authorship before the term "middlebrow" had coinage, as well as the reception of his international bestseller, Sorrell and Son (1925). The final chapter examines how Deeping's fiction of the 1930s dramatizes his deep sense of cultural embarrassment and compares his rhetorical strategies with those of Q. D. ing the ways in which habits of thought derived from these texts informed Renaissance ideas about Eastern European space, this book shows how the threshold dividing the symbolic and the real is traversed and imagined as traversable. Re-reading early modern texts ranging from geographic and travel accounts to the early modern drama of Shakespeare and his contemporaries, this study argues for a questioning and perspectival dimension of early modern subjectivity as fashioned by these texts, which emerges as enabling and compelling. Irish Performance in Nineteenth-Century New York By STEPHEN ROHS

Eccentric Nation examines four performance events in nineteenth-century New York City in which Irish cultural nationalism was constructed and reinforced by musicians, actors, playwrights, speakers, paraders, and athletes, and disseminated among diverse crowds that included both Irish- and Anglo-Americans. Their contemporaries and more recent analysts alike have often taken these performance conventions as representations of a common Irish voice or a monolithic national identity. Close examination reveals a much more conflicted Irish community. What appeared as shared symbolism was contested among both Irish- and Anglo-Americans. Masculine nationalist heroes, visions of a romanticized peasant class, evocations of collective memories, and the repetition of performance traditions all served to reinforce the idea of a single community bound together. Those symbols often gave rise to diverse meanings that were circulated in the urban populace. Each chapter examines the staging of these four events that produced dissension in the Irish community, providing insight into the ways that a nation is imagined in different ways by a broad array of people who have a stake in its existence, even if they often disagree about its core identity. THE INTEGRITY OF IRELAND Home Rule, Nationalism, and Partition, 1912–1922 By STEPHEN DUFFY

This is an examination of how British parliamentary politics and conflicting views of Irish identity undercut and eventually destroyed the idea of "Home Rule" for all thirty-two counties between the years 1912-1922. As the position of constitutional nationalists became obsolete, Ireland split. Ulster Unionists dominated the northeast and Sinn Féin rose to power throughout the rest of the country. An expedient treaty negotiated and ratified in 1921-22 established an Irish Free State and removed the Irish question from the forefront of British politics until the 1960s. However, this work shows that the failure to protect and fully implement "Home Rule" compromised Ireland's integrity. It allowed for the creation of a separate state in Northern Ireland and incited a civil war that left long-term divisions among Irish nationalists. Subversive Silences asserts that throughout the twentieth and

twenty-first centuries, Latin American women writers have appropriated the notion of submissive silence and inverted it to constitute a sign of women's rebellion against the passive silence imposed by patriarchy. The book illustrates how seven contemporary Hispanic women writers (Marta Brunet, María Luisa Bombal, Rosario Castellanos, Isabel Allende, Rosario Ferré Laura Esquivel, and Sandra Cisneros) employ silence thematically and stylistically in the form of implicit narrative strategies, such as hyperbole, irony, parody, and cultural symbol, to create a feminist perspective in their texts. This study further traces how the manner in which silence is used reflects the particular time period, era, and country in which each work was produced. Written from a reader-reception standpoint, the book reconciles structuralist and poststructuralist approaches into a cohesive theory of the evolution of combative silences in the works of Latin American women writers. This book traces the growing importance of modern ballet and contemporary dance throughout the writer's oeuvre. The charismatic skill of Anna Pavlova initially convinced Cather that ballet had been elevated into the Kingdom of Art, and in 1913 she published a ground-breaking article in McClure's magazine called "Training for the Ballet." In 1916 Cather received a fan letter from the modern dance pioneer Ruth St. Denis, who apparently introduced her work to Martha Graham. Throughout the 1930s Graham used many of Cather's ideas to shape the face of American dance, while Cather herself was utilizing contemporary dance and ballet themes to add texture (and subversion) to her works. The Appendix provides the only extant list of the major performances in New York between 1906 (the year Cather moved to the city) and 1940 (when she published her last novel). Wendy K. Challenging the assumption that Lark Rise to Candleford is Thompson's only significant work, this book examines the whole of Thompson's oeuvre, including the poetry, short fiction, and essays that she published in women's periodicals before World War II, her book of poetry, Bog Myrtle and Peat (1921), and two posthumously published works, Still Glides the Stream (1947) and Heatherley (1979). In addition to reassessing Thompson's significance as a twentieth-century woman writer, this study explores the connections between Lark Rise to Candleford and the author's early work, questioning its current classification as a work of autobiography and arguing for a more nuanced, literary interpretation of this rural classic. SEEKING LIFE WHOLE Willa Cather and the Brewsters

This collection attempts to answer the question of how do people who are defined as outsiders create agency-how do they become agents of change, of social, political, spiritual, and cultural power-outside of those spaces that we traditionally understand as belonging to the powerful? The subjects in this collection vary: authors discuss contemporary hip-hop music; early twentieth-century literature; prison publications;

post-Civil War treatment of "free" African Americans; queer culture; and more. With two hundred sixteen illustrations, this is the first major study in English of the early nineteenth-century French satirist and proto-Surrealist, J. J. Grandville (1803-47). It consists of a biography of the artist and an annotated catalog of an album of his drawings at the University of Missouri. Yet both authors bridged their modernist/postmodernist divide through mutual examinations of the polemics behind heteromasculinity, Hemingway in The Sun Also Rises and Williams in Cat on a Hot Tin Roof. Hellenism and the Postcolonial Imagination: Yeats, Cavafy, Walcott follows the careers of three major poets of the Euro-

As colonial subjects, they inherited an Anglicized version of Hellenism whose borders might easily have excluded them as civiliza-tional "others." The book describes the diverse strategies they used—from Bloomian *kenosis* to Afro-Caribbean "sig-nifyin(g)"—to make Hellenism their own. Their use of Greek material, the book argues, is closely tied to their need as members of colonial minorities-Irish Protestant, Greek-Egyptian, and "part-white and Methodist"-to define themselves against mainstream metropolitan culture on the one hand, and nationalist constructions of the post-colonial homeland on the other. Their Hellenisms participate in the dialectic of local and global, as the poets at once indigenize the Universal Greek, and re-deploy him to hybridize national culture. The result is a triangulated dynamic that challenges established notions of the postcolonial. Among works discussed are Tennyson's "Ulysses," Yeats's "No Second Troy," C.P.
